
BTW Kraus, I never forgot about you eating my Little Debbie's while I was gone!








SPECIAL CONGRATULATIONS

The Teke Experience

Maybe a better question is how different was the Teke Experience for the many Eras of Fraters over the 50+ Years of Teke-dom? Or, for the most part, except for clothing style, pop music and the different definitions of "legal", has that experience been pretty much the same for all of us ECU Tekes regardless of when we pledged?

It is an interesting question... Is it as one of our great Lambda-Psi philosophers, Chip Russell, has said frequently over the years, "Boys will be Boys..." to explain our many excesses. Maybe we can extend Chip's insight to mean, "Tekes will be Tekes" no matter what year we were born.

I had the chance recently to introduce Kevin Robinson, Scroll #624, to Jim Kevil, Scroll #140, via phone. We talked for about an hour. After a few minutes the distance, the natural reserve we all have when talking to strangers was soon replaced with a familiarity and with several "Oh.

yeah... know what you mean" and "Been there". Kevin and Jim had a 39+ year big time gap between their Teke Experiences. That's a lot of time and potential cultural differences.

But what I continue to find is that 95 I was a melting pot that spans that time and differences.

Kevin pledged in 2014 and Jim pledged in 1975. Kevin grew up in NC. His parents moved to there from NY and Jim is from a small town, Sparta, NJ about an hour SW from NYC. Kevin pledged his Sophomore year and Jim pledged his Freshman year. Kevin was elected President his Junior year. Both were very involved in leadership. Jim recently handled all direct alumni negotiations of the Teke House's lease to Phi Mu Sorority. Kevin currently is leading sales for a technology company based in Raleigh. Jim recently sold his new car dealership franchise in Sparta after leading it for many years. His wife keeps him out of trouble now by insisting that he assist her with her very successful real estate business (I suspect that his assistance is limited to putting up signs and moves heavy stuff).

So, both Kevin and Jim are sales focused gunslingers.

What do you remember most about your times being a Teke:

Kevin: "There was always someone around the Teke House. It was my spot to go. It was my home and community. The boys were always within reach."

Jim: "The location of the Teke House was perfect. There was always someone in the TV Room. It was NEVER BORING...I felt I was lucky being a longways from NJ and there at the Teke House was always someone I knew. I am from a small town in the middle of nowhere NJ. I got the experience of meeting a lot of different people. It helped me to be exposed to that difference. I learned to communicate with all these different brothers from different backgrounds. Living in the House with so many diverse people was a great learning experience. It prepares you for real life. Living in the house particularly teaches you how to co-exist."

Kevin: "When you get into leadership roles you must develop skills to communicate with different personalities. One big skill is that you learn how to give Bad News... I also enjoyed the leaderships role to guide pledges and brothers through college. It was chance to build a better man and to improve the reputation of the fraternity. When I joined our reputation needed a lot of work. We had a reputation for drugs that was undeserved. From that I learned how to build something from nothing. I also had the responsibility to prepare the next level of leadership."

Jim: "Yeah, we had reputation issues also. Sports and our Boxing Tournaments greatly improved that along with the fun we had at socials. I think our location helped also. Most nice days we had something going on in the front yard. It looked like the Tekes knew how to have fun..."

What makes you most proud of the Fraternity?

Kevin: "The fraternity's Wounded Warrior support. We hosted an annual dinner event that raised a lot of money for that worthy cause. Everyone participated. **And, I am also proud of the Longevity of Friendship.** It is hard to understand what the Teke experience is from the outside. You can't understand what you haven't known. "

Jim: "Our project was the TKE Boxing Tournament. It was for a very worth cause, St. Jude's Children Hospital. Like Kevin, I am very proud of the money we donated. As they say, everything was proceeding "speedily" <u>UNTIL</u> (Boom, Boom, Boom) Ole Tommy decided to straighten out a hard-right curve. Tom's trusty and now "clean" carburetor Camaro exited the road, became airborne, jumped a ditch, missed 3 trees and finally stopped 50 yards later in the middle of a wet, recently plowed field. Would you stop and pick up an obviously inebriated, muddy, unkempt individual on a dark road in the middle of nowhere? Well, many such kind folks do exist in Eastern NC.

One of those kind folks was driving the car heading towards Poppa and stopped. He then

chauffeured Poppa directly to the front door of the TekeHouse... This wasn't the only fortuitous (2nd) event of the night! (Not being **impaled** on a tree was their 1st fortuitous event).

Okay, the story moves back to the TV Room... It was in that moment when Poppa walked into that TV Room and said, "Tom's in trouble" I knew right then I was part of a REAL Brotherhood. A lot of things quickly came together. Again, fortuitously (3^{rd time}), Fast Eddie was in the TV Room. He and another Teke brother who was sleeping upstairs, "Landus", had gone to the same high school. They had worked together part time at a gas station. Part of their work was operating a tow truck service. Quite fortuitously (4th), Landus' brother lived in Greenville and owned a tow truck (Amazing!). Landus borrowed it for our mission (5th) and that MUST HAVE BEEN SOME LATENIGHT CALL he made to his brother getting that permission.

We saddled-up everyone in the House along with the borrowed tow truck and set our caravan on the task of finding Tom. Poppa's description of the location was pretty sketchy. He was in way too much pain to lead us back (We gave him a beer from our Emergency Stockpile kept for just such occasions). Finding Tom & the Camaro was a lot easier than getting the Camaro out of that muddy field. We had to winch/drag it about 50 yards just to get it over to ditch next to the highway. Those Carburetor Cleaners were fortuitous or there was divine intervention that kept them from being maimed for life or worse. They had literally been catapulted over a ditch, narrowly missed hitting 3 trees and had not rolled over a dozen times (Seat Belts?? We don't need no stinking seat belts!!).

Fast Eddie and Landus were a hoot to watch working together that night. They had a lot of towed cars found in ditches, fields, and along I-95 in their past. They knew exactly how and what to do. Landus almost continuously made hilarious jibs at Eddie... "What are you doing back there Eddie? Making a sandwich..." Okay, maybe that doesn't translate as "funny" by your definition reading this now BUT when it was going on 4:00 in the morning in a muddy field **then** it was pretty funny...

We towed the mighty Camaro back to Greenville and parked it at Kings Row Apartments before any of Pitt County's Finest discovered us/it. Mission Accomplished! That was one sad looking muddy car sitting in the middle of Kings Row's parking lot. It looked as if it had been dropped out of a dirty sky but it was in amazing good shape in spite of its "adventure." That night, about 44 years ago, was a great example/definition of "Teke Brotherhood"... Tom had been "in trouble" and HIS BROTHERS without question, complaint or beer (We even left the beer at the House) immediately stepped-up to help.

During "my Teke ERA", the Middle to Late 1970's, there were many occasions when "_____'s in trouble". Those troubles sometimes were serious and seemed monumental. Often, they were just plain <u>dumb</u> in retrospect. Sometimes it was just as simple as someone needed help with a class.

There's been a lot of dramatic comedy around 951 over its half century. Occasionally, there

was real tragedy such as when Al Meeks was killed in a senseless traffic accident. In all those times and ways, you could always count on your Brothers to saddle-up and support you. I am sure each of you from your own Teke ERA can recall numerous times when one of your brothers found himself "In trouble". Maybe it was even you. Through it all "we" stuck together. Those "troubles" further bonded us together at 951 and those bonds linger within each of us even to today.

As a personal note, I have been a Lambda-Psi Teke for approximately 2,612+ weeks. Through it all, it has been a comfort to know that it has never been a journey alone. Thanks! **Teke for Life!**
