





In July 2006, Lambda Psi brotherhood lost Scroll #511 Owen Czapiewski to an unfortunate ATV accident in Minnesota. Owen was an integral member to not only the fraternity but ECU at-large. He served as Prytanis, Inter-Fraternity Council (IFC) President, and was even Mr. Chi Omega. The brothers he left behind felt compelled to honor him in a memorial held next door to the TKE house at ECU's Catholic Student Center. It was standing room only and honorary Lambda-Psi brother, the now late Jeff Griffin eulogized Owen in a most fitting and poignant ceremony. When speaking of Owen's selfless leadership style, tenacity, and goal-oriented mindset, Jeff quoted a poem entitled, "The Builder" focused on describing someone who builds with care, in order to make the world he knows a little better because he was there. Owen left a huge imprint on the hearts and minds of so many and is someone whose legacy is worth fighting for to keep alive. Every TKE related action, phone call, text, and conversation lays a brick towards our brotherhood. Owen is not the only brother we've sadly lost too early, namely Jonathon Bennett, a well-respected and beloved brother who was tragically taken from us in 2013*. It is important that we can still honor these brothers by continuing to go ALL-IN building our alumni association and maintaining the bonds made at 951 E. 10th St.

Major Change at ECU!

Wow! Over ten years in the making between master planning meetings, budget wars, and a dogged commitment, ECU leadership and student organizations collectively built the recently opened <u>Main Campus Student Center</u>. The living room for the University is a sprawling 220,000 square foot facility that is a visual representation of ECU's connection to people and industry of Eastern North Carolina, the City of Greenville, and our Pirate traditions. The center is now home to the Dowdy Student Store, Retail Spaces, one 14, 000 square foot Ballroom, Theater, Dining Options, multiple lounges and study rooms, and finally a 24 x 42 foot Pirate Vision Outdoor Digital Display. Check it out over alumni weekend in September!



ECU is on track for completing its \$60 million Dowdy-Ficklen Southside Renovation Project over the summer. Just in time for our September 2019 Lambda Psi Alumni Weekend. New coach Mike Houston recently stated, "we have a beautiful structure going up over here on the Southside, and I can't wait to see it this fall, Sept. 7, for our home opener," Houston added, "our administration and us are in the process of doing a lot of renovations within the athletic facilities with things that help in recruiting the very best student-athletes and most importantly, things that will help in developing our student-athletes once they get here." This is the most extensive project to enhance Dowdy-Ficklen Stadium since it opened in 1963 and will give our Pirates a spacious and desired state-of-the-art press box, club level and suites. 


BROTHERHOOD BIOS

Our Road to TKE-dom

Jim Malory was the Dean of Men at ECU for many years. He was a very fine man, but rarely did he call about anything but fraternity related embarrassments, issues and problems such as, "Your fraternity has been accused of stealing all the toilet tissue from Jones Dorm." (And, our pledges did it... Oh, I still remember that call!) You never wanted to have him call you back **twice** about ANYTHING. Your first thought was, "Oh No... What did we do wrong NOW!" Dean Mallory was much too busy to call just to chat...

Personal Note: While I was Chapter President, he once asked my Saintly Mother if she contributed any money to my college education. He asked her because he thought I was more interest in chasing coeds and living the fraternity life than getting a Degree in Economics. Let me add honestly, Dean Mallory was also a fine judge of character and personal motivation... and a great friend

So, imagine that you are the newly elected President of ECU's newest "Business" fraternity and Dean Mallory calls you. <u>That ain't good...</u> That call happened to Ron Greenwood, Alpha Kappa Psi (A-K-Psi) newly elected President. -- And, he still REMEMBERS that call 52 YEARS later!! -- A-K-Psi was a "Business" fraternity. **From this single call our origins as Tekes began**. We

A-K-Psi was a "Business" fraternity. From this single call our origins as Tekes began. We became the Lambda-Psi Chapter of Tau Kappa Epsilon because Dean Mallory and the IFC were upset with how "Social" this "Business" Fraternity had become.

Here's how it all started...

Dean Mallory told President Ron that ECU was going to pull **A-K-Psi Business Fraternity "Charter." Why?** Because ECU's **Social** fraternities were complaining that A-K-Psi was acting exactly like a **Social** fraternity and **NOT** following campus rules for social fraternities. These social fraternities put forward hard evidence, "A-K-Psi has its own frat house and it even has a *Party Room*. Their Party Room is even nicer than some of our party rooms." Truth was that the A-K-Psi Party Room was used EVERY weekend. ECU coeds were *often* invited to participate in drinking adult beverages (legal drinking age then was 18 years old) and to listen to Rock & Roll music. It was alleged that these supposedly serious, studious Business Majors were Party Animals... One of them had been arrested (with a coed) for lewd behavior while hiding in the Court House's shrubbery one evening after a party. Imagine that... on the Court House property.

Social Fraternity guys were chartered to do such entertaining... NOT business fraternity brothers! These A-K-Psi brothers were acting just like the social fraternity brothers. Something was very wrong with this and it had to be STOPPED!

The accusers also pointed out that bands such as the likes of "Little James Brown" and the "Bryn Mars" played there. ["Little James" and his band would play all night for \$150 PLUS all the bourbon they could drink]. This was just additional evidence that **these Business Majors were just social fraternity boys disguised in Gant Shirts/IZOD Polos and starched khaki pants**. These things (partying, socializing with coeds & sorority girls, and drinking bourbon) were the sole responsibilities of **Social** fraternities and not the purview of a **Business** fraternity. This had to be STOPPED!



True, A-K-Psi had a couple of business speakers show-up now and then but even some of those "speakers" actually appeared at some of the regular Saturday night parties (research I presume). President Ron knew they were in trouble and something needed to be done FAST. Oh yeah, I didn't mention before that Dean Mallory was **also** the Campus Administrator for the Inter-Fraternity (Social) Council... The IFC! BIG trouble was ahead of A-K-Psi!!

Background

A couple of years before that memorial call, back in 1965-66 (as they say, *Long Ago in a Galaxy, Far, Far Away...*), Horace "Jay" Johnson -- a business major -- recognized that all of his college party friends were also business majors. They grouped up over the weekends and partied together. They were serious about partying and equally serious --on weekdays-- about graduating with business degrees. Jay's group of friends had similar interests, ambitions and studies (they also traded business school tests and notes on which professors to avoid). Jay didn't like the social fraternity scene. He had tried Rush but he couldn't find the right fit. There was even a business fraternity already on campus, but its culture, like that of the social fraternities, just didn't fit Jay's or his friends' culture and interests.

Jay is in his 70's now and if you knew Jay's business history over the last 50 years, you would know that he has been a very successful entrepreneur in numerous ventures. Looking back now, 53+ years later, it seems natural that Jay would think, "*Heck, let's just start OUR OWN Business Fraternity*." So, he talked to his business major party friends. They started called around and found that a National Business Fraternity, A-K-Psi, would issue a charter to them and would even assist them in becoming an officially sanctioned ECU organization.

Amazingly, in a matter of a few weeks, Jay and 20+ other business majors friends/partiers became the founders of the newest Business Fraternity on ECU's campus, Alpha Kappa Psi. Imagine that! Soon the "Brothers of A-K-Psi" recruited two ECU Biz Professors on board as Advisors. One of the professors knew of a large 2 story home, built by an early Greenville Socialite, **that was scheduled for demolition in 3 years**. Back then, Greenville was in a redevelopment mode, so the landlord saw a way to get paid rent from a bunch of college boys with no downside... *The house was going to be demolished anyway*. The brothers now had an official location, bedrooms to house brothers, semi-working bathrooms, a chapter room... PLUS the house had a detached 2 car garage. One day an idea was floated, "Let's turn that bad boy into a Party Room…" Without any thought on their "Return on Investment," the newly installed fraternity brothers started expanding this 2-car garage into a large, comfortable "Party Room." Since the City of Greenville was going to destroy it, the Building Inspector ignored it, the neighbors were few and the landlord didn't care, that garage was transformed with little knowhow or to exacting specifications into GREAT Party Room!!! Someone would say. "Let's do this" and they did it.

ECU's newest "Business" Fraternity, A-K-Psi, was soon Rocking & Rolling (literally) and a major unanticipated side-effect was the birth of Fraternity Brotherhood. The more these guys worked together the more they turned a bunch of individuals into "Brothers." And, the fraternity grew. As you can imagine, with this type of ammunition the recruiting of pledges went well. One thing you should

Note: Back then "Business" fraternities on ECU's campus did NOT have the same restrictions and timelines for Rush as did the social fraternities. Biz Frats didn't have any. This was a big advantage to grow new "business" fraternity.



So, things were good for ole A-K-Psi until Dean Mallory's call to President Ron Greenwood. Ron knew they had a great thing going. "What are we going to do now?"

All that living together in the A-K-Psi House, building the Party Room, studying together, the dramas of campus life had morphed these -- business major friends -- into TRUE Fraternity Brothers. They were not going away quietly or without a fight. So, what they did was create committees and duties to define a course of action (they couldn't help it because they were business majors after all). Their first order of business was to start calling National Social Fraternities that did not have chapters on ECU's Campus. Unfortunately, all of them required the brothers to establish a "Colony" on campus first for a couple of years. Then the national fraternity would decide if they "qualified" for a permanent "Charter". A "Colony" status probably would not work for the IFC since this wayward business fraternity already had more brothers -- and better parties -- than most of ECU existing social fraternities!

But, amazingly, ONE of the national fraternities listen to the guys. They were impressed with what these "business majors" had accomplished over their 2 years as an A-K-Psi Chapter. It was very impressive. That national social fraternity was, Tau Kappa Epsilon. Back then, as now, TKE is the largest social fraternity in the world. The *TKE Wizards* up in Indianapolis liked what they saw happening with A-K-Psi. They decided to take a chance on what Jay, Ron and all the other brothers had built on the roots of that old house in Greenville and its Party Room. TKE National granted the exclusion of Colony status and rolled the brothers into a Charter status. That met the requirements of the IFC. It was a sad day for many of ECU's social fraternities but probably gave Dean Mallory a BIG smile.

The Lambda-Psi Chapter of Tau Kappa Epsilon was Chartered and Established on East Carolina University's campus on the 16th of November 1968 with 41 newly installed brother signing the Scroll.


